
Centred Discussion Guide



Part 5: Centred In The Storm

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INTRODUCTION

STAYING CENTRED IN A STORM

For some time our Immanuel congregation musicians have been almost addicted to a worship song called "Raise A Hallelujah". The chorus says:

"We're going to sing, in the middle of a storm, Louder and louder, hear the praises roar, Up from the ashes, hope will arise, Death is defeated, the King is alive."

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Think of a time when your foundations were shattered...

- What kept you going?
- Name someone who really made a difference for you in that hard time.

THREE WAYS OF THINKING THAT WILL CENTRE YOU IN THE MIDDLE OF A STORM

1. EVERYTHING IS SPIRITUAL

Religious people often divide life up into two zones - spiritual and ordinary - often called sacred and secular. Added to is the idea that God is more interested in the spiritual/sacred and less interested in the ordinary/secular.

- How do you feel about this division of life?
- Where in our lives has this sort of thinking crept in?
- How is this kind of compartmentalisation unhealthy?

The Bible actually does talk about special things or people being *set aside* for special holy purposes. And the Bible does call us to worship together and says there is power in gathering. But this sort of compartmentalising of life is not Biblical. The Old Testament does not even have a word for spiritual. The New Testament uses the word, but never to divide up life into compartments. So the Bible does not have a concept that divides life up into the sacred and secular. Instead everything is spiritual because God is a part of everything. There is nowhere that God is not.

- What do you hear? Which spoke to you? What do you notice?

3. EXPECT JESUS

Matthew 14:22-33

Immediately after this, Jesus insisted that his disciples get back into the boat and cross to the other side of the lake, while he sent the people home. After sending them home, he went up into the hills by himself to pray. Night fell while he was there alone. Meanwhile, the disciples were in trouble far away from land, for a strong wind had risen, and they were fighting heavy waves. About three o'clock in the morning Jesus came toward them, walking on the water. When the disciples saw him walking on the water, they were terrified. In their fear, they cried out, "It's a ghost!" But Jesus spoke to them at once. "Don't be afraid," he said. "Be brave. I am here!" Then Peter called to him, "Lord, if it's really you, tell me to come to you, walking on the water." "Yes, come," Jesus said. So Peter went over the side of the boat and walked on the water toward Jesus. But when he saw the strong wind and the waves, he was terrified and began to sink. "Save me, Lord!" he shouted. Jesus immediately reached out and grabbed him. "You have so little faith," Jesus said. "Why did you doubt me?" When they climbed back into the boat, the wind stopped. Then the disciples worshiped him. "You really are the Son of God!" they exclaimed.
